




<p><b>13</b> <b>checks and balances</b></p>  <p>the way in which the different branches of government keep each other from having too much power</p> <p><i>Example:</i> A veto is an example of checks and balances.</p> <p>(SS050102)</p>	<p><b>14</b> <b>veto</b></p>  <p>when the President turns down a bill or refuses to sign it into law</p> <p><i>Example:</i> The President vetoed the bill because he did not agree with it.</p> <p>(SS050102)</p>
<p><b>15</b> <b>override</b></p>  <p>when the Congress votes to cancel a President's veto</p> <p><i>Example:</i> The U.S. Congress passed the law by overriding the President's veto of the bill.</p> <p>(SS050102)</p>	<p><b>16</b> <b>limited government</b></p> <p>the government can only do what the people have given it the power to do</p> <p><i>Example:</i> Limited government means the government can't just do whatever it wants.</p> <p>(SS050102)</p>
